40 41 SUPREME COURT JUSTICE NOMINATION 42 43 WHEREAS, we are a country divided against itself through its politics; and 44 45 WHEREAS, this nation faces profound issues to secure its future without need for further divisions and 46 contentiousness; and 47 48 WHEREAS, Justice O'Connor has been a moderating influence on the court, who was described by the President as 49 "a discerning and conscientious judge;" and 50 51 WHEREAS, the rule of God hinges on reconciliation and as Christians we are called to a ministry of reconciliation; 52 53 THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Twenty-fifth General Synod of the United Church of Christ meeting in Atlanta, Georgia, in accordance with its understanding of the reconciling mission of Jesus Christ, encourages 54 President George W. Bush to use a process of openness and bi-partisan consultation in nominating Supreme Court 55 56 justices; and BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that we encourage the United States Senate to engage in an open, non-partisan and thorough debate on the merits of any Supreme Court nominees and support a consultation and confirmation process 2 that evaluates nominees based upon their public records and actions, and 3 5 FINALLY BE IT RESOLVED that to maintain the integrity of the court, uphold the rule of law, ensure equal justice for all, and offer hope and reconciliation to our divided nation, we encourage the President and the Senate to engage in a nomination, consultation, and confirmation process that is fair, truthful and beyond reproach.
